President's Message

Greetings Dear Colleagues!

As a beekeeper I've learned that in the beehive, nature offers us a masterclass in precision, teamwork, and resilience – qualities that mirror the art of medicine and the spirit of Ukraine during these challenging times.

Bees maintain a near-perfect environment inside their hive, keeping the temperature constant between 93-95°F to nurture their young. They achieve this through subtle yet coordinated actions – fanning their wings to circulate air when it's too warm, or clustering tightly to generate heat when it's cold. This meticulous care is also evident in the way bees transform nectar into honey. They collect nectar, mix it with special enzymes, and fan it to evaporate excess water, creating a natural, long-lasting nourishing treasure. Both are incredible achievements.

Just as the bees' collective efforts sustain the hive, many of you work tirelessly, to restore health and detect medical issues.

This lesson of unity and perseverance resonates deeply in our communities and in Ukraine today. UMANA partners with multiple organizations, including UCCA, Project Cure, and CUF to amplify our efforts and we're collaborating with a number of groups.

UMANA also has a partnership with the UCU Medical Clinic in Lviv. Last year, despite the challenges of war, the Ukrainian Catholic University opened a medical clinic to serve as an educational center and to care for the city's patient population which includes many refugees. Their focus includes family medicine, women's health, pediatrics, mental health and rehabilitation. Our project focuses on education and we'll be sending out more information to our members on how to register and help.

In January of 2025, **Dr. Ariadne Bach**, a radiologist from Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, officially started our project. She travelled to Lviv to present a lecture on Oncological Emergencies and to spend two days with the ultrasound medical team performing exams at the medical clinic. It was a great educational success and collaboration! Watch your emails for more updates and opportunities to get involved.

In both the beehive and our community, working together leads us to create something truly worthwhile.

Orest BALYTSKY, DMD (Northern California Branch), went on a dental volunteer trip to Ukraine in September 2024. He spent two weeks providing dental care for the soldiers undergoing rehabilitation at the Unbroken Rehabilitation Center in Lviv. Dr. Balytsky's focus was to provide endodontic care. However, after assessing the alarming status of dental health among Ukrainian servicemen, he realized the need to perform restorative dental procedures. The rate of tooth decay among the soldiers serving on the frontlines is distressing, with most showing extensive decay of the majority of their dentition.

As Dr. Balytsky said, "The work was challenging, especially mentally, but it was also very rewarding. Times like these make a huge impact. Despite all the difficulties and inconveniences (long travel, mental toll, frequent air raid alerts, etc.), you want to go again. You realize how important it is to support the people who fight so bravely and valiantly for their country and the values of a free world."

For our fellow dentists. There is a great need for dental supplies in Ukraine. If you have any equipment or materials that you could donate, you can contact Dr. Balytsky, so he can deliver them on his next trip. There is also need for dental volunteers, and if anybody is interested, he can help in finding opportunities.
